# FORWARD by Scotty Campbell

In 1974 Alberta rangeman J.A.(Scotty) Campbell introduced the first draft of our history as follows:

The writer, a charter member of the Society for Range Management, recalls attending Society conventions at Denver in 1949 and San Antonio in 1950 at which the seeds of the Inter- national Mountain Section were sown, germinated and took root.

The Denver Convention was held in the Shirley-Savoy Hotel, and Wallace R. Hanson of Calgary and I were the only Canadians present. I was recognized as coming the farthest distance, even from the Canadian north where all severe winter weather is believed to originate. Several members from Montana, including Tom Lommasson and Mel Morris of Missoula, gravitated with us, and we found ourselves discussing an international section to include a natural region rather than following state boundaries. Later, these personal contacts furthered the idea.

In the October 1949 Journal of Range Management, F. G. Renner pointed out that the Society then had four local sections: Wyoming, Colorado, Utah and Texas. He stated, "We need more... Until we have strong local sections well distributed throughout the country, we will not be in a position to marshall member- opinion on important questions or attain the position of influence which the Society needs."

Mel Morris, Wally Hanson and I drove together to the Range Society meeting in San Antonio in February of 1950, where the progress made so far and further steps toward an international section were discussed. At San Antonio the members from Montana and Alberta met formally. They felt that they had something in common and should share their knowledge and experience. Indeed, they share a heritage in "The Last Great West", so well depicted by artists Frederic Remington and Charles M. Russell. Besides, westerners are friendly and hospitable, especially ranchers, so that national prejudices are truly non-existent and cordial friendships are always evident at their gatherings.

Thomas Lommasson of Missoula and Wallace R. Hanson of Calgary need special recognition. Both felt that if this organization was to be of value, it should present the work of the technician in such a way that the fellow running cattle on the range could meet him and discuss his grazing problems. The writer can vouch for their efforts to make this a reality.

# INTRODUCTION by Chuck Hitch

The organizational meeting of the American Society of Range Management was held in Salt Lake City in January, 1948. Later that year the members in Wyoming formed a local section, the first one approved by the Council. This was followed by five other sections in 1949.

From the beginning, members in Montana and Alberta considered forming a section. At the San Antonio meeting in 1950 they presented a petition, proposed constitution and by-laws to the Council. The Council was hesitant since it did not follow the same pattern as those already formed, but after a strong case was made for the new ideas, it was approved with the name extended to include the word Northern. (Note: The word "Northern" was dropped in 1954, and "International Mountain Section" became official). Because of the few northern members at San Antonio, it was decided to officially organize back in home country, as indicated by the following quote:

"An organizational meeting is planned for early spring as roads open up and transportation by car becomes easier. Although all of British Columbia was tentatively included, members in that province indicated their desire to affiliate with the Pacific Northwest Section. Membership in that mountain area is presently about 100 and still growing, so that organization should increase the membership substantially."--Tom Lommasson, U.S. Forest Service, Missoula, Montana.

The initial step in organization of the Northern International Mountain Section was taken at Helena on April 29, 1950. Quoting from the Journal of Range Management, Volume 3, Number 4, page 367 as follows:

"The section will devote itself to furthering understanding of rangeland management problems, especially in the northern mountain area." Twenty-six members participated in the meeting, despite an unseasonal snowstorm which blocked several roads.

The eastern boundary was described as follows: "From Bridger to Columbus to Big Timber to Moccasin to Great Falls and north to the Canadian Line, thence to Bow Island, to Brooks, to Camrose, to Edmonton, to Athabaska, and west of the Athabaska River." This boundary has been more administrative than restrictive as members choose the Section best suiting their interests.

One general meeting and one field meeting are planned for each year. The first field meeting was scheduled for early September at Waterton Lakes National Park, Alberta, and was to include a trip over range in the Alberta Forest Reserve.

INTERNATIONAL MOUNTAIN SECTION HISTORY

The newly formed International Mountain Section, IMS, added to the aims of the parent organization, ASRM, with the following objectives:

- To stimulate interest and research in the conservation of the range resources of the mountain and foothills region of Montana and Alberta and other similar grazing regions.
- To bring together, for mutual benefits, those people interested in the range.
- To promote international co-operation in the field of conservation of our resources.

FALL TOUR - Sept 22-24. Location: Waterton Lakes, AB. Attendance: 50 people. September 22 - Registration and Executive Council Meeting.

September 23 - Field trip started with a trip of 25 miles to the Alberta Ranch. A discussion was held there on ranch organization and led by ranch owner, F.E.M. Robinson. Other ranchers in the discussion were Frank Lynch-Staunton of Lundbreck (later Lieut. Governor of Alberta) and George Chattaway of Nanton.

Then to Coleman, Alberta, over the Forest Road through the Livingston Ranger District to the Waldron Ranch where observations were made and discussions held regarding cross breeding with Brahma cattle.

The banquet meeting was addressed by Ray Johnson, Range Specialist at Montana State College, Bozeman, on his trip to Tibet and Inner Mongolia.

FALL MEETING - August 30-September 1. Location: Virginia City, MT. Attendance: 65 people. The tour started in Virginia City, old mining town and former State Capital, and proceeded to Gravelly Range sheep allotments of the Beaverhead Natnl Forest.

Near Crockett Lake, Tom Lommasson presented an interesting discussion on stocking rates and pointed out that dams sealed with bentonite have been constructed to catch run-off water from snow melt. He also led a discussion on the ecology of abandoned bed-grounds. Lunch was served at the top of Lazyman Hill where Roald Peterson presented graphs showing the responses of grasses to climate at elevations higher than 9,000'.

A banquet included a lecture on the history of Virginia City and a play by Virginia City Players.

Day Two. Camp Creek on Ruby River where Joe Woolfolk of the Northern Rocky Mountain Forest Experimental Station, Missoula, described research projects underway, e.g.: ecology and control of wyethia or mule-ears. Jack E. Schmautz dealt with results of sagebrush eradication. Reseeding trials were described by E. E. Redman, W. A. Schowe, R. G. Johnson and Roald Peterson.

IT'S A GIRL! Cigars were passed out by proud father, Bob, in celebration of Jo Ann, born to Nancy Ross the night before. He announced: "Due to proper management and a few special practices, we have been able to increase the stocking of the Home Ranch by one heifer: Born Aug. 31, 1951; Weight 7 lbs 2 oz."

Hargrave gave an illustrated talk on ranches of southern Alberta.

Business Meeting: Junior Range Activities discussed. The feeling was that progress had been extremely satisfactory. Papers on range improvement by George Chattaway and Baden Campbell. Banquet speaker, W.G. Anderson, Wardlow, Alberta. His theme: "Destroy the grass and man shall be destroyed."

May 16. Tour Lethbridge Experiment Sta. Cattalo barbecue.

FALL MEETING - September 4-5. Loction: Bozeman, MT. Business Meeting discussed grazing on irrigated pastures. Dr. R. E. Stitt, Fort Ellis, spoke on range reseeding and utilization of reseeded species by sheep. "Chuck Wagon" dinner at Flaming Arrow Ranch. Speaker, Bud Molohon on "Range Management in Jordan.

SPRING TOUR - May 21-22. Location: Helena, MT. Attendance: 45 people. On May 21st Duncan Moir and co-workers took the tour over the Townsend Ranger District. This gave the group a close look at the forage ranges in the Helena area. On May 22 some of the group went on a boat trip through the Gates of the Mountains on the Missouri River. Others visited areas of grazing in the National Forests adjacent to Missoula.

FALL MEETING - September 3-4. Location: Claresholm, Alberta. Attendance: 85. Theme: range resources with a first hand look at the Alberta Foothills; familiarity with forage species, range utilization, and cultural methods. A display of common grasses of the area was set up by Scotty Campbell. Sods were dug and arranged in pans with names attached.

Papers delivered by Wally Hanson and Russell Bennett on the forage resources of the Alberta Foothills and methods of use. Bennett is a rancher in the Waterton Lakes area of Alberta. During the afternoon a field trip was made to the Stavely Grassland Station, where experimental pastures were inspected and questions answered by Alex Johnston and Ron Peake. Mr. A. Palmer, Station Superintendent, gave background information.

September 4: 100-mile tour through the heart of the ranch country. One of the ranches visited was that of John Cross. After an enjoyable lunch served on John's A7 Ranch with true western hospitality, a discussion of grazing and methods of growing forage was held. Later the group drove to the historic Bar U, EP (Duke of Windsor), and D ranches.

SPRING MEETING - May 26-28. Location: Great Falls, Montana May 27 - Augusta, MT, to tour state Sun River Elk Range, inspection of Gibson Dam and Sun River Canyon. May 28 - Business meeting at McDonald Lodge chaired by H. J. Hargrave. Lunch at Dick Fabrick Ranch near Bynum, MT.

FALL MEETING - Sept 1-3. Location: Lethbridge-Medicine Hat. Attendance: 70. Banquet Speaker: Dick Painter of the Lethbridge Experiment Station, on "Insects and Man."

September 2 - Short business meeting at Dominion Experimental Station. Education Committee of Chairman Homer Turner, R. W.. Peake and W. R. Hanson was appointed The group then toured experimental irrigated pastures. Following lunch, the group drove to Medicine Hat and saw the irrigated pastures and feedlot set up of the Tansley and Scholten Company.

September 3 - Tour of Cypress Hills, south and east of Medicine Hat. Dr. F. W. Gershaw had given the group many of the historical aspects of the area the evening before. Mr. A. A. Murphy, Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration (PFRA), discussed water conservation in the area. A stop was made at a site commanding a striking view of the Medicine Hat country and the geological formation of the Cypress Plateau. At this point Wally Hanson and Jim McArthur led a discussion covering vegetative types and management practices used by ranch operators of the area. Jim also mentioned the "cattalo" with which he was working and other work at the Manyberries Range Station.

The change in name of the Section seems to have taken place in 1954. The notice of the Spring Meeting was directed to "The Northern International Mountain Section." The notice of the Fall Meeting to the "International Mountain Section."

SPRING TOUR - June 8-10. Location: Jackson, Montana Attendance: 110. June 8: Tour of Big Hole Basin and adjacent ranges. "Dusty" Sparrow, rancher and Beaverhead Soil Conservation District Supervisor, conducted an interesting and scenic tour over portions of the Hirschy Meadows, Tom Schultz Ranch, Ruby Ranch, and the Eleven Twenty Ranch The tour ended with a delectable friendship hour at the Fred Hirschy Ranch. Banquet speaker that evening was Ed Whitworth, local rancher and immediate past-president of the Montana Wool Growers Association.

June 9 - The group traveled south to Dillon observing vegetation and range conditions due to differences in annual precipitation and grazing pressures. This was followed by a visit to the P & O Ranch where Homer Turner, Conservationist for the Beaverhead Division of the Rock Island Oil and Refining Company, showed the group some experimental seedings of various grasses and legumes in arid, semi-arid and irrigated sites. These seedings were made to reduce the pressure on native ranges.

FALL MEETING - September 8-10. Location: High River, AB.

Held in conjunction with the Western Stock Growers' Association Annual Meeting,
September 8 was devoted to an indoor meeting discussing range problems common to
both organizations. A panel discussion on game problems related to Range
Management was held with the following people taking part: E.S. Huestis, W. R. Hanson,
Gordon Cummings and John Cross. Moderator for the panel was D. J. McKinnon,
Carsland. Alberta.

Retiring IMS Chairman Duncan Moir congratulated John Cross as the first rancher to be elected to that office. John Cross replied that he felt a signal honor had been paid to the practical phase of range management.

SUMMER TOUR - June 21-23. Location: Okotoks, Cochrane, Calgary. June 21 at Okotoks - Banquet, film and business meeting.

June 22 - Okotoks, Cochrane and Calgary areas featuring reseeding in the foothills and plains of Western Canada. To Millarville for a panel discussion on "Feasibility of Converting Grainlands to Grassland in the Foothills," and tour of F. E. Gourlay Ranch observing grainlands and brushlands reseeded to grass.

FALL TOUR - September 6-7. Location: Helmville, Montana. Attendance: 80. First day stops were under the guidance of Bob Ross and A. S. Erickson and included looking at ranges in excellent, good, fair and poor condition. The grass cover in the Helmville Cemetery was used as a standard for comparison. Seedings of intermediate wheatgrass were examined for seed production and it was noted that wide row-spacings gave increased seed production. Infestations of leafy spurge, toad flax, goatweed and Canada Thistle were observed and control measures discussed. Conservation and range management practices at the Ed Bandy Ranch were observed.

Will Cotter, long time area cowboy and rancher, gave the talk at the banquet. He talked about ranching methods and range conditions when he first came to the area in 1885 as compared to present time. He remembered playing games at a picnic in an area close to the cemetery. It was all grass then and now is knee deep sagebrush.

The Game Ranch of the State Fish and Game Department was also toured. This ranch had been purchased to alleviate some elk pressure on private lands. Mel Morris had carried out extensive elk studies there for the past three years and had some very interesting figures on elk preference or rather lack of preference for browse in the winter.

10th AGM of the parent Society - Jan 28 to Feb 1. Location: Great Falls, MT. Though the outside temperatures never rose above 40 degrees below zero, attendance peaked at 515--greater than any previous Range Society convention.

SUMMER TOUR - June 13-14. Location: Milk River, Alberta. Banquet Speaker, Robert T. Coupland, Department of Plant Ecology, University of Saskatchewan. June 14 included a visit to the Joe Gilchrist Ranch, the Sweet Grass Hills, and the cabin occupied by Charles M. Russell and Con Price on the Dave Thomas Ranch on the west slope of the West Butte. The visit to the Joe Gilchrist Ranch showed shortgrass range in excellent condition. The Howard Leslie Ranch and the Writing-on-Stone areas showed shortgrass range and Indian picture writing or petroglyphs. An exhibit featuring grasses and other plants commonly seen on the rangelands was set up. This was very acceptable since grass is the perennial product of our rangelands; livestock are merely the means of processing this forage into meat, wool, leather and other products. Bob Coupland made numerous observations and led many discussions during the tour.

FALL MEETING - Sept 5-6 Location: Sieben Ranch, Cascade, MT. This is Councilman Hibbard's place and a long time sheep unit. The resultant repression of the smaller grass species and forbs and the complete domination of Rough Fescue was clearly shown. The only exception was on early spring use where sheep use had also suppressed the Fescue. Since it was the only area that warmed up early, the management problems were apparent.

Banquet at the Rainbow Hotel in Great Falls. Speaker, Joe Townsend, State Fish and Game, Bozeman, with dramatic slides on problems with the Gallatin elk herd and winter starvation that occurs.

SPRING TOUR - June 12-13. Location: Dillon, Montana. Attendance: 150 people. Jack Brenner, State Senator, was the banquet speaker on "Grass and Nutrition." Following Brenner's talk, Bill Burkitt spoke on the methods used in arriving at the cause of nutritional problems.

June 13 - The tour was to the Armstead-Horse Prairie Region and arranged by Homer Turner, Ed Atkins and Ben Slanger with a lot of help of others. It covered privately owned range, BLM and Forest Service lands.

1st Stop - Deferred grazing. Formerly dominated by sagebrush and now in good grass cover. Discussion led by Ben Slanger, SCS.

2nd Stop - Big Bluegrass cut for hay on the Cross Ranch. Discussion led by Ben Slanger.

3rd Stop - Sagebrush plowing and seeding. Discussion led by Jim Cotter and Neil Morck, BLM.

4th Stop - Horse Prairie Administrative Site. Illustration of over-use and underuse. Discussion by Carl Simpson, U.S. Forest Service. An additional stop at Bannack, first Territorial Capital. Sight-seeing and some history were covered.

FALL MEETING - Aug. 28-29 Location: Bassano, Alberta. A banquet was enjoyed on the evening of August 28th. The main speaker was Don McKinnon, Dalemead, Alberta, who gave an account of the early ranching days in southern Alberta and in particular the McKinnon involvement in the last round-up on the CPR Block, south of Bassano, in 1929.

August 29 a tour of the LK Feed Mill, Feed Lot and LK Ranches was carried out under the direction of the McKinnon family, owners of the enterprises. A visit was made to Sundial Butte where the Indians had made a strange configuration of rocks. Supper was enjoyed at the Bassano Dam where Carl Anderson, Superintendent of the Eastern Irrigation District at Brooks, Alberta, gave a talk on the Dam and irrigated areas.

SPRING MEETING - June 4-5. Location: Claresholm/Stavely, AB Attendance: 40. Local Arrangement Committees sometimes run into annoying difficulties. Alex Johnston had guaranteed the local ladies attendance of 110. Fortunately attendance was much better the next day, and additional registrations covered the loss.

June 5 - Attendance: 100. The tour featured a revisit to the Stavely Range Experiment Station, last visited in 1953; changes since that time were noted with interest. An afternoon program was held in a tent at the Station and devoted to the general topic of community pastures and their improvement by means of brush control. The program was presented by Ray Youngman, Superintendent of Community Pastures under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Assistance Act, and Mel Aaston of the same organization. An evening steak fry concluded with Doug Sutherland's talk, "It costs less to die in Alberta." The speaker pointed out that estate tax regulations had been modified, provincially, with substantial benefits to land owners.

FALL MEETING - Sept. 17-18. Location: Anaconda, Montana. Attendance: 65. Keynote Speaker, R.C. Setterstrom, Montana Power Company, set the tone with, "All People Benefit From Good Range Management." Dick, a section member, is active in soil conservation district work in Montana.

September 18 - Tour of the Georgetown Lake area with about 100 present. There is some conflict between summer homes and grazing and a real possibility of conflict with the lake water quality. A need to develop adequate water sources is recognized. Bill Williams spoke on clearcutting of lodgepole pine in small blocks up to 40 acres. Increased forage will be helpful in reducing pressure on other range. Bob Jorgenson pointed out water production, control and use in the area for industrial and irrigation use. Favre Eaton brought out the highlights of the grazing industry in the Deer Lodge National Forest. Range condition and grazing practices were noted. Water intake studies were also discussed. Finally, mountain meadow feeding of cattle, indicated a definite preference for native hays over tame hays on the Tom Collins Ranch.

Prior to registration, many members joined in a conducted tour of the US Forest Service Smokejumper Center and new Fire Research Laboratory west of Missoula.

June 18 - A visit to the Grant Creek Ranch -- one of the outstanding Angus breeding ranches in Montana. This was followed by a tour of the National Bison Range at Moise. At the headquarters a lunch prepared by the ladies of the Moise Grange was enjoyed. The tour showed the many forms of wildlife that are present: deer, elk, antelope and bison. C. J. Henry, Superintendent of the Range, gave a brief history and management review of the Range. He stated that in response to public sentiment, President Theodore Roosevelt had approached Congress to establish the Bison Range in 1908 in an effort to prevent extinction of the buffalo in the United States. As a result, 19,000 acres of grass and timber were set aside for the purpose.

SUMMER MEETING - July 6-7. Location: Calgary, Alberta. Attendance: over 300. From the Highlander Hotel the tour proceeded to Longview, Dutch Creek, the Gap and the Waldron Ranch. This tour was held jointly with the SRM Summer Meeting-- the first time a National meeting has been held in Canada. The tour was held in the Eastern Rockies Forest Conservation District. There was a camp-out on July 6th with a feed of barbecued beef prepared on a spit by John and Harold Sears.

Because of expected numbers, a special effort had been made to reach grazing permit holders and many were in attendance. Membership was up for the year from 169 to 212. As a means of attracting press to the tour, the cost of their attendance was solicited from a utility company, which appeared happy to assist. Also, a good portion of the Summer Meeting expense was borne by interested business firms, namely, a fertilizer company, a bank and a petroleum association. There is no doubt that the sending of an invitation to every grazing permit-holder in the Eastern Rockies Forest Conservation area had much to do with the splendid turnout. The meeting was a financial success and added about \$900 to the Section treasury. This "cushion" gave Section officers the courage to propose various events-- for example, essay contests and youth awards -- that they might not otherwise have authorized. Previously, the Section had operated in what can best be described as a "hand-to-mouth" fashion.

Keynote Speaker: Lieut-Governor (and historian) Grant MacEwen, "The Livestock Industry in the West," including the story of the Cochran Ranch. On the second day a tour was conducted to a number of local ranches and range sites, including Neil Harvie's Glenbow Ranch at Cochrane and a roto-tilling land-clearing project on Clarence Copithorne's ranch at Jumping Pound. Neil Harvie presented a film entitled, "The Year-Round Ranch Story" followed by a barbecue. A plant identification contest for children and youths was organized, which drew considerable interest and much discussion. Both meetings were attended by a variety of people including ranchers, educators, bankers, conservationists and a number of women and children. The Section voted to sponsor an essay contest for university students to encourage interest in the art of range management. A research project of wintering cattle and sheep on native range with various kinds of supplement was discussed. Also presented, the early gold mining history of the Red Bluff area.

Range sites and condition classes, deferred grazing results, big sagebrush control, use of tame pastures in conjunction with deferred grazing systems and results of proper range use were observed.
